Determination pays off for Isael Vazquez '15

Even though he worked two jobs, Urbana resident Isael Vazquez found he could barely make ends meet. Believing education would provide a better life for him and his family, he turned to Parkland College.

"I always felt like something was stopping melike I could only go so far before I hit my head," he said. But through a grant-funded program Parkland began offering students in 2013, Isael succeeded further than he'd dreamed.

After taking Parkland's ESL classes to improve his English skills and earning his GED through Parkland Adult Education, Isael signed up for the Accelerated Opportunity (AO) Program. The state-funded program works to increase the number of students transitioning from GED completion to college. Parkland's AO program provides basic writing, reading, and math classes at no cost, and also allows students to take college courses toward earning welding certificates.



Despite working full time, taking classes, and caring for his family, Isael was determined to finish the AO program—and it paid off. "I studied hard and made close relationships with my instructors, who supported me in so many ways," he explained. In the second semester of enrollment, Isael was the first to earn Parkland's Adult Student Transition Scholarship, which helped him pay for tuition. He also made the Parkland Dean's List during his last semester.

"The teachers were so great and helpful, too; they made sure my welds were good and always took extra time to help me," Isael said.

He finished the AO welding program in May 2015, and has since earned American Welding Society D1.1 certification in seven positions. He was soon hired as a full-time welder by Colmac Coil Manufacturing Inc. in Paxton. "I know that through hard work I can do many things to provide for my family and be successful," Isael remarked. "I'm thankful to

Parkland for the AO program, and will take additional coursework when I can to get even better at my job."

ACCENT ON STUDENT LEARNING: Mathematics

Dr. Erin Wilding-Martin leads curriculum overhaul

When a need arose to improve student outcomes in mathematics, Dr. Erin Wilding-Martin stepped in, leading an overhaul of Parkland's math curriculum that gained national attention.

In 2011, Wilding-Martin and a faculty team were asked to review Parkland's college algebra courses. They found that 75% of the students taking Parkland's developmental math sequence weren't in majors that required college algebra. "We were sending all of our developmental math students through a sequence that prepared them for college algebra and calculus—when only 25% were even headed that direction," she explained. "They needed general education math or introductory statistics."

For many students, the original course sequence was a painful hurdle, with some giving up along the way. So Wilding-Martin's team created a new Mathematical Literacy course, designed to 1) prepare students for the critical thinking and writing required in statistics and gen ed math, 2) cut a semester out of the developmental math sequence for students who don't need college algebra, and 3) give students the technological and teamwork skills employers want.

"The result is a challenging—but more relevant—course that I find incredibly rewarding to teach," remarked Wilding-Martin. "My students are having great discussions about how math is really used, and I'm better able to connect with and mentor them."

In recognition of her work, the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) honored Wilding-Martin with the 2015 Outstanding Faculty Member Award for its Central Region. The nonprofit organization represents the governing boards of over 1,200 US community colleges.

High schoolers Tyler Wegrich, Jonathan Walder jumpstart healthcare careers

They live miles apart—both in hometowns and career destinations but high school seniors Tyler Wegrich and Jonathan Walder agree that coming to the new Early College and Career Academy (ECCA) is jumpstarting their futures in health care.

Tyler, a student at Bement, enrolled in the certified nurse assistant program, one of six fields students can choose from in the ECCA, which launched this fall. "I want to be a dietitian, to help others who have diabetes stay healthy," explained Tyler, who has Type 1 diabetes. "Earning my CNA through the program is getting me ready for that goal." Although she makes the drive to Champaign herself, her high school is paying for her ECCA classes.

Through the ECCA, high school juniors and seniors earn dual credit (counting toward a high school diploma and college), as well as industry-approved trade certificates and licenses. Students also enjoy career-specific facilities and experienced instructors that would be cost-prohibitive for school districts to provide. For Jonathan, one of six students from Paxton-Buckley-Loda in the program, the emergency medical services route was the way to go: "I've always wanted to work in a surgical room, or to be a nurse anesthetist," he said, before heading back to PBL in the school van.

This semester, Tyler and Jonathan are taking Orientation to Health Careers and Medical Terminology classes. Next semester, they'll move into their specialty course, explained Nick Elder, director of Education for Employment System #330, a K-12 career and technical education cooperative. "These orientation-level classes help students make up their minds about the careers they want to pursue, with coursework broad enough to accommodate different career paths."

CAREER PLANNING: Job fairs
