# PARKLAND COLLEGE **Grants and Contracts** July 2010 – June 2011 Annual Grant Report FY 11

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The mission of Parkland Grants and Contracts is "to help administrators, faculty, and staff obtain funding to provide resources for projects that will benefit the students of Parkland College and the residents of District 505." This past year has brought successful collaborations and an increased number of faculty members involved in the grant-seeking process. In FY2010-11, 71 grant applications were submitted to federal, state, and private funding sources. This is an increase of 5 over last year. Of these applications, 40 resulted in new funding for the college, an increase of 3 over last year. Over 30 faculty and staff members were involved in writing grant applications, including many first-time applicants. From July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011, \$5.8 million was received from competitive grants and entitlements. Of this amount, \$4 million was awarded by the State of Illinois. Awards from the federal government totaled nearly \$1.5 million.

Many of the grants received in FY11 are having an impact beyond the Parkland campus. In the past year, Parkland was awarded a five-year, \$1.4 million TRiO Student Support Services grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The purpose of the Student Support Services program is to provide academic and other support services to low-income, first-generation or disabled college students to increase students' retention and graduation rates and facilitate their transfer from two-year to four-year colleges.

Through its Grow Up Great program, the PNC Bank Foundation forms partnerships with community-based nonprofit organizations to enhance educational opportunities for underserved, pre-kindergarten children. The \$13,000 Parkland received from this grant allowed the Staerkel Planetarium to purchase a new show called One World, One Sky: Big Bird's Adventure and is funding planetarium field trips for local Head Start students to attend the program. Planetarium director David Leake and Illinois Public Media submitted this application.

The Extreme Entrepreneurship Tour is an organization dedicated to teaching young people the value of entrepreneurship through half-day events which incorporate presentations from successful entrepreneurs, panel discussions, and brainstorming sessions. Parkland was included on a tour of colleges in the Chicago and downstate Illinois areas sponsored by the Coleman Foundation. The Entrepreneurial Tour event at Parkland was attended by high school and college students from throughout District 505. Business and Agri-Industries department chair Bruce Henrikson and instructor Mark Kesler in collaboration with the Parkland entrepreneurial program received this \$8,000 grant.


Parkland's Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning received \$2,500 in funding from the Illinois Community College Faculty Association. The grant is being shared with Heartland Community College in Normal and will fund a faculty teaching and learning workshop to provide opportunities for faculty members to improve the teaching and learning process. The recipient of this grant was Center for Excellence director Erika Hackman. During the past year, the college also took a leadership role on a multi-college U.S. Department of Labor trade adjustment assistance training grant application and submitted a proposal to the U.S. Department of Agriculture requesting the creation of a downstate biomass project area to provide payments for local growers of miscanthus.

This report provides a snapshot of the impact grants have made at Parkland this year. The Grants Office staff is looking forward to working with the college faculty and administration as we pursue additional opportunities in the coming months. 

#### **Fiscal Year Dollar Totals**




## **Fiscal Year Dollar Totals by Source**


